





What's On at Harmans Cross Village Hall



Russian leader Josef Stalin called D-Day "the greatest military operation of all time". The Allies' best brains had been involved for years in its planning and in deception campaigns to confound the German defenders of Hitler's 'Atlantic Wall' in France. Special equipment - everything from swimming tanks to giant floating harbours – had been prepared, and landings, including at Studland Bay, practiced. Now, everything was down to the Allied troops, as they embarked on the ships of the huge invasion fleet from Swanage Pier and all across southern Britain.

How did the plans and equipment perform in real life? What worked and what did not? Military historian Dr Phil Judkins takes us through the triumphs and tragedies of the D-Day landings, based on the very latest research, showing which parts of those plans and equipment did their jobs - and which did not, and why. From simple errors to bad weather, from mistakes by those on the ground to inaccurate intelligence, from excessive Allied caution to unexpectedly determined resistance by enemy troops, all the deep secrets and forgotten people of D-Day are described in this talk, with tribute paid to the fighting troops who made a huge success of this vast operation; to those who did not make it home, or were terribly wounded; and to the men and women who worked 'behind the scenes' at Langton, Worth, Tilly Whim, Durlston and Acton, to give those troops the victory with far fewer casualties than had been expected. Special mention is made of the secret parts played by Swanage and its surrounding communities.



About Us

We're a social group whose aim is to raise money for the National Trust. We don't do conventional fundraising however: instead, we have talks, social events, outings and short breaks. In brief, we enjoy ourselves, and any surplus money we raise goes to the Trust. All the money we raise is spent locally, funding projects at Corfe Castle, Studland Bay or in the surrounding countryside owned by the Trust.



We were formed in 1987. We are one of about 150 such groups around the country (known as Supporter Groups). Over the years these groups have raised millions of pounds for the Trust, and our group has raised over £180,000. We've funded a variety of things including a new pedigree bull for the Red Devon herd on

Hartland Moor, stone flooring in the Mason's Lodge inside Corfe Castle, and interpretation boards and seats in numerous locations. Our most recent donation allowed a Volunteer Group at Corfe Castle to buy a very sophisticated piece of woodworking machinery to make their work quicker and easier.

Most of our members live in the BH19 and BH20 areas, and most are members of the National Trust, but neither of these are absolute requirements. We have members living in Poole, Bournemouth, Broadstone, Blandford and Wimborne, and a few who live even further afield.

Membership is amazing value - £5/year for an individual, or £7.50/year for joint membership. Members receive a Newsletter in Spring and Autumn, giving them news and details of forthcoming events. We're happy for members to bring friends to our events, but they pay a small amount extra.

We have monthly talks from September to March. These alternate between All Saints Church Hall in Swanage and Carey Hall in Wareham. Also coming up we have trips to Killerton House in Devon (with an exclusive tour of recent restoration works) and to Southampton for shopping and museum or gallery visits. In December we have an overnight stay in Bath, with visits to the Christmas Market and to Tyntesfield House. Next June we have a four-night stay at Studley Castle with trips to National Trust properties Packwood House and Baddesley Clinton, and a day in Stratford-upon-Avon. On the social front we have a beetle drive, a barbecue lunch at a local pub, and an afternoon of Kurling (not a misprint – it's a version of curling that can be played on a wooden floor).

Update from Studland Parish Council September 2024

Studland Parish Council met on 15th September. The key items emerging from the meeting are:

• The National Trust have started a Wood Pasture scheme – turning grass fields for the grazing of one type of animal to a wood pasture scheme (pasture but with a lot of trees and bushes). The aim of this is to increase biodiversity: multiple types of animals eg cattle, ponies, pigs, will graze together. 380 hectares are being converted to this initially, with more later. 50,000 trees and bushes will be planted.



- Studland has applied for a pedestrian crossing. This has been agreed with Dorset Council, who say the implementation will be in the summer of 2025
- Studland has also applied for the central part of the village along Swanage and Ferry Roads to be converted to a 20 mph speed limit area. Again we are hoping this will be implemented next summer.
- The owners of Knoll House Hotel have appealed against the decision by Dorset Council to refuse planning permission; the hearing for this will be later in the Autumn
- There are now more than 80 eco-buoys in Studland Bay, off South Beach. Many of these will be removed to be cleaned this Autumn and then reinstated in the Spring. The eco-buoys are being widely used and are helping make Studland Bay a Marine Conservation Zone
- Over 230 residents of Studland, Swanage and from elsewhere in the Isle of Purbeck packed the Village Hall in Studland to discuss the application by the Ferry Company to increase tolls. No one was in favour of the increases, with several residents talking of the hardships that the cost of the increased tolls would bring. Many objections have now been submitted to the Department for Transport. It seems that the likely date for the Inspector's hearing will be December 10, 11, 12 in the Studland Village Hall.

3rd September –We were delighted that at our September meeting Maggie Hardy and her colleague Mary Buck came to explain how to use defibrillators. This was an open meeting and we were pleased to be joined by so many guests. The demonstration was extremely helpful, and if it means that in the future even one person can be aided by a defibrillator in the village it will have been a very worthwhile event.





1st October - Connor Winter from the 'Greenbrick Workshops' that recycle bottle tops will be telling us all about the project. The 'Greenbrick Workshops' was founded by Ben Gibbons and Connor Winter after the pair were forced by the Covid-19 pandemic to return to the UK from Nepal, where they had been working with rural communitiesto reduce the damage caused there by plastic pollution. 'Greenbrick Workshops' use cutting edge technology to wash and shred waste plastic, then heat and mould this into bricks. The bricks are used to build affordable homes in some of the poorest countries in the world. The Project initially aimed to establish 1,000 workshops over 10 years, which it hoped would prevent around six million tonnes of carbon dioxide being released from plastic burning and during the production of clay bricks and cement. Potentially this would also allow for the recycling of around 800,000 tonnes of plastic

that may otherwise end up in oceans - around 1% of global ocean plastic leakage. It will be fascinating to find out how far the Project has come over the last four years and to know where the plastic bottle tops we collect at Aquarius go!

Updates from the National Trust

Beach wheelchair at Studland

We have four wheelchairs available at Knoll Beach but the iewel in our crown is our new Magic Mobility Xtreme 8 wheelchair. The Xtreme 8 is a true all terrain chair, but most importantly, it can be driven on the beach. We received this message from a visitor, Andy, who used the Xtreme 8 recently: "I have an NHS powered wheelchair which cannot go on the beach, but I dreamt



one day I would be able to go along the beach like I used to. When I tried the beach powered wheelchair, one of the staff walked with me until I got my confidence then I went along the shore. It was amazing. I never thought I would be able to do this again." Wheelchairs can be hired for free (nonmonetary deposit requested) from the visitor reception at Knoll Beach. A lock-up is available for wheelchair swaps, and training will be provided on use of the Xtreme 8. Booking is recommended.

A herald of good luck and joy at Corfe Castle

Visitors and staff at Corfe Castle were taken aback recently to see a huge bird perching on top of the keep. The bird was a white stork, traditionally considered to be harbingers of hope, joy and rebirth. Storks are a native species that was once widespread in the UK, but they disappeared over the centuries, probably due to habitat loss, hunting and persecution. The myth that newborn babies are delivered by storks probably arose because they are white - linked to purity - and often build their large nests on church towers, close to where people live. Storks feed on small mammals, earthworms, snails and large insects in water-meadows and grasslands. Several storks have been recorded on the Corfe River in recent years. These could be migrants from Europe, or ones from reintroduction projects in Sussex. Let's hope they become a regular sight here. Do let us know if you spot one. What will be caught on camera?

The puffin cameras we placed on the cliff near Dancing Ledge have been removed by high ropes experts. Volunteers are now underway with the painstaking task of studying the images taken by the motion-sensor cameras - over 65,000 stills! We know that three breeding pairs of puffins returned to the ledges this year but sadly it appears that no chicks survived to fledge. We're hoping the footage will tell us why.

Speed dating for bats

Did you know that Winspit Quarry in Worth Matravers is a nationallyimportant swarming site for bats? Under cover of darkness, these strange creatures fly from miles away to find a mate and hibernation spot. Corfe probably sits right under the bat super-flyway! To find out more about this bat speed dating, we've mounted detectors on three poles in the quarry. They are picking up audio recordings, indicating the type and number of bats using the caves. Purbeck has 15 of the UK's 17 types of breeding bat, although not all of them swarm. The technology will back up the amazing work that volunteers from the Dorset Bat Group are doing to monitor the site. Working under licence, they trap bats in nets, measure them and record their size, weight and sex. They are then ringed on their forearms previous tags have shown that some bats come to Winspit from as far away as 27 kilometres. Please note most of the swarming takes place in the dead Photo: Brown long-eared bats, National Trust Images/ of night, with different bats arriving at different times, so there isn't a mass event to see. And remember that Winspit Quarry is closed to the public for



Your local Food Bank continues to serve those in food poverty who live in Swanage and the surrounding villages. We're all volunteers and we're all well settled into our new home at the United Reformed Church (URC) up the High Street near the Spar now. When we're open there are clear signs up letting you know which part of the building we're in.





Many thanks, as always, to all you lovely people who donate to us - whether that's via the collection bins (in Budgens, Coop, Costcutter and Spar), in person or by money donations. And at this time of year, huge thanks also to the schools,

churches and other local groups that hold collections at Harvest and (dare I say it) Christmas time. Cheers to the Festivals too, for donating your leftovers!

Every tin, packet, jar or item of toiletry or pet food is much appreciated and passed on – as long as it's **unused, in good condition and in date!** We try to re-use as many carrier bags as we can, but always appreciate your donations in **bags for life** that we can then refill.

Donations of excess fruit and veg from your garden are also appreciated. Please bring those to the Swanage Food Bank while we're open – between 12 noon and 1pm on a **Monday**, **Wednesday or Friday** is helpful, so we can include them in that days' food bags. (We're open until 2pm though).

Talking of Christmas (sorry!) many of you, very kindly, like to make a **Christmassy food donation** to make someone else's Christmas just a little better eg. Advent calendar, biscuits, sweets, Christmas pud or a box of mince pies. These are all most welcome, but please could you get them to us **by the end of November**, if possible, so we can plan ahead (but please check they have reasonable Best Before dates). Thank you for helping us to care for our community: it's a team effort!

If you're struggling a bit and need some help with food, please don't hesitate to get in touch with us on 07759 230313. Leave a message if we can't answer and we'll get back to you asap. If you continue to need help, we may ask you to get a referral from an Agency that knows your circumstances eg. school, social worker, housing, Citizen's Advice. We can usually deliver to you if you can't get to the Food Bank to collect.

In the colder weather, do look out for neighbours and others you know who might be finding things a bit difficult – but perhaps wouldn't want to complain or ask for help. Suggest they give us a call, or maybe you could even help them to make the call? We do need to actually speak to the client though to find out a few dietary details etc.

Items we need most at the moment:

Drinks eg. tea / coffee (small sizes), squash, fruit juice • Biscuits / Savoury crackers • Tins of cold meat / fish • Soup Tins of pasta meals (eg. macaroni cheese, ravioli, spaghetti bolognese) • Baked beans • Pasta or curry sauces • Noodles Tins of 'hot meat' (eg. Stew, minced beef & onion, curry, chilli con carne, chicken in white sauce) • Puddings & custard

Swanage Community Defibrillator Partnership

We were very disappointed that despite numerous invitations being sent out and significant Facebook publicity more people did not attend our recent Open meeting to discuss the development of SCDP and to consider how best we can sustain this now important community service.



However, we were very grateful to those of our Defib guardians who were able to attend and to Cllr Chris Moreton, Deputy Mayor, Swanage Town Council, who took great interest in our work and admitted that he had no idea so much work went into providing the Defib infrastructure. Chris will be working with Deirdre and Tim Mersey when as members of the Defib Guardian team they undertake their fortnightly defib checks, to get an even greater understanding of what is done and what is required.

Defibs have now been deployed 229 times since we started this project almost 10 years ago and with so much national press recently highlighting the need for defibs and trauma packs it is reassuring, I am sure, that Swanage and local villages are so well equipped with 46 defibs now managed by SCDP and available for public access.

Sustainability of this service is now a key part of our work and we would welcome anyone interested in joining our steering group to have a chat with us . **Publicity and fundraising** are key elements as we are now looking to develop the provision of Trauma cabinets (our first is on Shore Rd. Swanage by the toilet block) in addition to the Defib cabinets so we would welcome anyone with these interests /skills to join our small steering group team. At the meeting we were very sad to hear that Ian Brown BEM will be standing down from the Steering Group (hopefully just for the time being!) but will be maintaining an interest in the maintenance and monitoring of all our SCDP estate.

Mining Museum is delighted with feedback and enthusiastic support from special tours

Flu Vaccination

The flu vaccine helps protect against flu, which can be a serious or life-threatening illness. Each Autumn, the NHS offers the vaccine to people at higher risk of getting seriously ill from flu.

This year, those eligible for the flu vaccine include:

- People aged 65 and over
- All those aged 18 to 64 years who have health conditions that make them more vulnerable
- Those who are the main Carer for an older or disabled person, or are in receipt of Carer's Allowance
- People living in Care Homes visits to Care Homes will start on 7 October
- Frontline health and social care staff
- · Pregnant women they should book their vaccinations with their Maternity Team
- Children aged 2 or 3 years on 31 August 2024
- School aged children and young people (from Reception to Year 11) their vaccinations are given in school.

Those living with someone who has a weaken immune system should contact the Surgery for advice as to whether they should receive the vaccine. Swanage Medical Practice is now sending out invites to adults eligible to receive the vaccine, either by text or by letter. You will be invited to attend during a specific time slot on either 5 or 12 October.

COVID Vaccination

The NHS will also be offering Autumn COVID boosters to the most vulnerable this Autumn. The following groups will be able to have an NHS COVID Booster between 3 October and 20 December:

- People aged 65 and over (including those due to turn 65 on or before 31 March 2025)
- People aged between six months and 64 years who have health conditions that make them more vulnerable
- · People living in Care Homes for Older People
- · Pregnant women they should book their vaccinations with their Maternity Team
- Frontline health and social care staff.

The NHS will contact eligible people directly, but you can also book your own appointment from 23 September via the NHS App or by calling 119.


